Constitution Review Committee

Committee to review the KHCC constitution and recommend any needed amendments. The other four members of the committee are Charles Bronson (Aikenside), Jody Barkley (Doon), Duane Holm (Valley View), and Bobbie Mystrom (Davenant).

The Committee has decided to submit proposed amendments in two phases. The first phase will include changes that directly affect how the Council elects its governing body. The aim is to have these amendments in place by the annual election in June. Other proposals will be presented in the summer.

At the March 16 KHCC meeting we will present the following four proposals for the first reading. Those proposals, and any others from the floor, will then be on the agenda for the April 20 meeting for a vote. The full text will be distributed at the March meeting and should be posted on the KHCC website by the time you read this.

- Restructure the "Executive Committee" as a "Board of Trustees"
- The Board of Trustees will be comprised of 9 elected members: The five present offices plus four members-at-large.
- Rename the current position of "Vice-President" to be "Vice-President for Administration"
- Remove confusing reference to the "president elect"

KHCC Mid-Term Report Card

ast year KHCC amended its constitution to add a new office, *Vice President for Community Planning*. One of the constitutional duties is to provide periodic reports on progress of implementing the community plan. These are brief highlights of the 4-page report Mimi Gingold presented at the February Council meeting. The full text was distributed at the meeting and is published on the KH website.

Volunteers

We have the best volunteer spirit in decades.

Housing

■ The new housing chair Bruce Long is building committee membership and developing an action plan.

Recreation

■ Karen Thomas has revitalized the Recreation Committee; Winter Holiday Celebration at Geier Apartments; Rejuvenation of Ken-Sil, including \$1,000 Invest grant for baseball; Lang Field tot lot has been renovated with new equipment; plans for community picnic in July

Beautification

■ Woodford Road improvement project expanded to include a new garden at corner of Kennedy; Both Drake & KH Parks have active advisory boards; KHCC won \$1,000 from Keep Cincinnati Beautiful, including \$500 for Joanie Weidner's Litter Magic and new Litter Zone program; New trees to be planted this spring based on comprehensive tree lawn survey

Committee chair is needed!

Safety

■ Very active and excellent C.O.P.S. program, with leadership of Josh Swain; police have been responsive to KHCC's efforts to remove drug & crime elements; police also have been very helpful in removing junk cars.

Development

- Van Foster leads a well-organized and active committee; based on Committee's proposals, City has budgeted \$1.8 million of KH development; bids solicited for market study of Montgomery Rd. corridor; great community involvement to block the Beverage Cave.
- KH Arts Center. Fantastic grassroots development not anticipated in the Community Plan but welcomed with gusto!

Design & Infrastructure

We've done very little so far in this area; recommend comprehensive survey of streets to identify needs.

Education

Ce Holm has been prime mover in trying to persuade the Board of Ed to relocate Silverton School at Montgomery & Kennedy. No results to date.

Youth & Seniors

Committee chairs and members are needed for both; possible "youth summit" to develop ways to meet needs of our young residents.





Litter Patrol Zones Keeping up appearances

hat happens when the three Litter Magic clean-up events are over? Does all the hard work of your neighbors just disappear, or reappear as litter? It's doesn't need to, and here's how you can help make sure it doesn't. Become a Litter Patrol Zone Volunteer!

What is this program?

A person, couple, family, or group of neighbors adopt a "Litter Patrol Zone" in Kennedy Heights to clean on a regular basis for one year.

There are 12 zones, each about 1 mile long. It is not necessary to sign-up for the zone where you live. The more we spread out the cleaner the neighborhood!

How does it work?

You patrol your zone at least once a month. but more is better! Trash bags and plastic gloves are available. You are free to call me for supplies when necessary. The trash you collect would be added to your regular weekly pickup by the Sanitation Department.

How do I join?

You can sign-up at the Great American Clean-up. A list of all volunteers in your zone will be mailed to you. You are free to meet and arrange a regular schedule with your fellow patrol zone volunteers. If you can't make the signup but are interested just give me a call.

This year we will honor all Litter Magic and Patrol Zone volunteers at a summer celebration. Look for details in the newsletter.
