Constitution Amended

n the second reading, proposed amendments to the KHCC constitution passed by unanimous vote.

- Restructure the Executive Committee as a Board of Trustees
- Expand the number of board members from five to nine, all to be elected by KHCC.
- Change the title of Vice-President to Vice-President for Administration

Finances (Bob Kamp, Treasurer)

- Funds available: \$17,544 (includes 1,000 in CD for KHAC)
- March income: \$4,119
- March expenses \$1,264.
- Invest in Neighborhoods proposal for \$12,000 has been submitted.

Announcements

- Flyers with details for the Litter Magic Great American Clean-up on April 24 were available from Joanie Weidner.
- Jeff Dey encouraged all to participate in Perennials & Pastries (see p. 1)
- George Foster baseball camp, child ballet classes, free meeting space, summer swim lessons and various other activities planned for the Pleasant Ridge community center this summer. (Tom Reese, Recreation Dept.)
- The KH Art Center still needs the community's continued support.

Police Report

Detailed discussion of the serious drug problems in KH especially in the Northdale and Kennedy areas. Two Northdale landlords and a Northdale tenant described open drug dealing on their street.

The community needs to unite to address these issues and recharge the Safety committee.

The Neighborhood Business District Walk is a program initiated by Councilmember Laketa Cole to give City Council and staff a first hand look at issues facing Cincinnati's communities. Our walk is scheduled for Thursday, May 13th, at 2:00 p.m., starting at the KH Arts Center.

Development Dynamo!

W ithout a doubt KHCC's most dynamic committee this year has been Commercial and Office Development. Chaired by Van Foster, the committees main focus has been on how best to develop the "blighted" stretch of Montgomery Rd. between the former Mr. Kelly's and Kennedy Avenue. Last spring the committee put together a grant proposal that impressed City Hall and resulted in KHCC's inclusion in the 2004 City budget, with about \$1.8 million earmarked to be available to KHCC for neighborhood revitalization. Although KHCC has not yet seen development funds, we continue to receive assurances that it is one the way.

Montgomery Road Corridor Market Study: Before making any development decisions, the committee wants to make sure KHCC heads the right direction. Several companies competed for a contract to conduct a "market study" of the corridor. After intensive interviews with the two finalists, the committee chose Kinzelman, Kline, & Grossman. This firm is already doing a similar study for Silverton. The study will be funded by money from the City grant.

Urban District Overlay (Zoning) Valerie Butler is an attorney who grew up in KH and has recently returned. She's become the committee's zoning expert. Although Cincinnati has just established a new zoning code, the City has essentially frozen development in the Montgomery corridor until next September to give the community and City a chance to determine the appropriate zoning. It is now zoned "commercial/community/automobile, ' which, e.g. apparently allows drivethrough businesses. The committee favors a change to "commercial/ community mixed."

CDC? Assuming that the City grant funds materialize, should KHCC itself get into the development business directly or, instead, set up a separate "community development corporation"? The community research team , headed by Jennifer Hackman, is working on recommendations.

Infrastructure: Kennedy Connector?

Chuck Dragga (a civil engineer) has been collecting information about the proposed "Kennedy Connector." This would be a "super connector" to make it easier for traffic to move from the foot of Kennedy across I-71 to the new stores in Oakley (Same's, Meier, etc.). The 5-lane road would connect with Kennedy at Duck Creek and stretch across I-71 to connect with Ibsen and interstate ramp at Ridge.

Community Image – Kimberly Tidwell has taken over from Jeffry Weidner as team leader of this team that focuses on improving KH's image and will be preparing a proposal for Safe & Clean Neighborhoods grant for trees in pots along Montgomery Road.

School Locations Still Uncertain by Noel Morgan, President KHCC

K HCC continues to send a persistent message to the Cincinnati School Board: Unite the KH elementary students into a single attendance zone and build a neighborhood school on the board's land at the corner of Kennedy & Montgomery. That was the thrust of motions adopted in March, 2003 and again in February and March, 2004. The most recent motion (adopted unanimously) had three parts:

- Join all Silverton and KH children into a single Attendance Area.
- Build a neighborhood school at Kennedy & Montgomery
- Renovate Woodford School and keep it as a racially balanced Magnet School for students throughout Quadrant 3.

Although the Board's present plans do not now include a school at that corner, KHCC delegations have continued to meet with members of the school board and school administration. Over the past year, we have met at least once with every board member.

Last month board member Melanie Bates met with about a dozen of us at the KH Arts Center, and a couple of weeks later we met with board member Rick Williams. Both gave us some reasons to believe that we might yet see a school on the corner that Mr. Williams described as the "most logical and best school site in the City."

April 26 Duane Holm and I spoke at the school board meeting. We stressed that our first priority is to reunite our students into a single attendance area and used a map to show how students are now divided among Silverton, Pleasant Ridge, and John Parker.
