Winterfest Exceeds Dreams

Winterfest 2004 was unique & important in several ways:

- It spanned and joined two communities--Kennedy Hts & Pleasant Ridge.
- Winterfest went from "good idea" to final production in less than 10 weeks.
- It was not a fund raiser--at no point were participants asked to spend a dime.
- Community institutions (schools, churches, Arts, City, Councils) pooled their resources for the mutual good.
- > The holiday spirit was infectious.
- And hundreds of residents came out on a cold winter night for an evening of pure fun.

Weren't there? Here's what you missed

- In the early evening, the Recreation Center gym in Pleasant Ridge was packed. Arts, crafts, performances. Mainly aimed at younger residents.
- Two horse-drawn taxis ferried riders between KH & PR from 6:00 'til 10:00.
- A jazz/blues band braved the cold to perform almost steadily from 8-10:00 on the Arts Center lawn.
- Hundreds of folks (many for the first time) toured & visited in the Arts Center.
- Trees were decorated by art students from Woodford, Pleasant Ridge, & Nativity Schools.
- Ceremonial lighting of the Arts Center tree, with countdown by Regina Carswell (Ch. 19).
- And, as promised, lumenaries (candle-lit bags) lit both sides of Montgomery Rd. Almost one mile of peaceful candles.

Minutes of KHCC General Meeting 11/16/04

(This is a summary of highlights; complete minutes are posted at www.kennedyheights.org) Ernie Barbeau, Secretary Attendance: Approximately 45

Treasurer's report

2004 income will be around \$44,000. For this calendar year expect a surplus of approximately \$10,000.

Police & Safety

- Officer Engelman introduced two non-uniformed officers from the Violent Crime Squad; they spoke about arrests and street crime (especially drug related) in our neighborhood. New concern: reports of small gangs of youths randomly assaulting individuals.
- Residents reported activity on Northdale and the Kennedy bridge has significantly decreased, but concern is that drug activity has dispersed to several new locations.
- Iris residents recently established a Block Watch and encouraged residents to contact him or the Health Department about abandoned buildings.

Prior Board Actions approved:

- donate to the Geier Apartments \$600 and the Council's unused computer
- donate \$600 to Shroder School's Community Service Program.

Other motions approved after discussion

- Amend Beautification budget for the purpose of upgrading the northeast corner of Kennedy and Aikenside, for up to \$2,400.00. Charles Johnson has been contracted to provide landscaping services.
- Cancel the Council's December meeting.
- Support Brandenburg Ln. residents in advocating for a *dedicated* street.
- Hold a combined *Council/Town Meeting* on Saturday, January 22.

Constitutional Proposals

Ernie Barbeau, Chair of the Constitution Review Committee, presented proposal for a *comprehensive amending of the Constitution*. He distributed two sets of documents: the current Constitution, and the proposed amendments. The full proposal is now available online. Ernie gave an overview of the proposal, and noted that final action will be taken at the Council's February meeting.

Announcements

- Karen Thomas (Recreation Committee) and Richard Cooke (KH Arts Center), reported on Winterfest festivities.
- Van Foster (Commercial and Office Development Committee): November 19 public hearing before the Cincinnati Planning Commission, on Beverage Cave's application for a building permit.
- John Nolan of the First Masonic District made some comments about their interest in converting the Shroder School property into a multiuse District Building, which would include senior housing, rooms for community activities and meeting, and a charter school.
- Kate Kern and Michelle Dragga invited residents to attend the Park Advisory Council's November 20 meeting.
- Ce Holm: 70% of KH voters voted for the school levv.
- Josh Swain: We are looking for funds to buy new radios for the Citizens on Patrol.
- Donna Faulk: She now works for the Vice-Mayor, so if we have any concerns to feel free to bring them to her attention.



Constitutional Proposals

In the fall of 2003 KHCC began reviewing its constitution for changes that would help the organization run for smoothly and better represent the residents of Kennedy Heights.

The first set of amendments were adopted last spring, adding four atlarge positions to the Board.

The Review committee has proposed more extensive changes for its second round. The new draft was distributed at the November meeting, with the aim of voting on them in February or March.

Proposed changes include:

- "Friends of KH": Affiliate status for non-residents
- > Staggered terms for the at-large **Board members**
- > 6-year (consecutive) limit for service on the Board & 4 years in one

There are numerous other proposed changes. Both the current constitution and the proposed "By-Laws" are posted on the website for your browsing pleasure.
