ast fall the Office of National Drug Control (the U.S. "Drug Tsar") selected Kennedy Heights as one of only three Cincinnati neighborhoods to participate in its 25 Cities Initiative. Here's the official description of the Initiative:

The Initiative will work with the leadership of 25 targeted cities—particularly in the areas of drug prevention, drug treatment, and public safety—to enhance cooperation and accomplish significant improvement in key measures of drug use in each city.

The local Initiative partners include numerous agencies active in Prevention, Treatment, & Enforcement that have promised to make a wide range of local resources available to Kennedy Heights. But they are not handing us an off-theshelf program. Instead they expect residents to identify our unique issues and concerns and work together with them to tailor a program that will work best for Kennedy Heights.

The Town Meeting is our first step in working with the Initiative. This is your opportunity to share your concerns, observations, frustrations, hopes and ideas. We don't yet have a full agenda, but we expect the day to look something like this:

Why is Kennedy Heights a Targeted Community?

Police records show that Kennedy Heights has one the City's highest rates of "calls for service" about drugs or drug-related problems.

However, we also have one of the City's lowest rates of violent crimes-usually associated with the illegal drug traffic.

While they may seem contradictory, these two trends were cited by the 25 Cities Initiative folks as positive indicators of a healthy neighborhood. Concerned citizens don't hesitate to report what they see. And the drug market (while certainly here) has not yet explored to a crisis level.

In short: They see what we see. A great residential community that with some help and attention can rid itself of a nagging problem

Beverage Cave Hearing in Columbus 1/26

ut for 3 days, it would be the anniversary of the City Hall hearing on the Beverage Cave's application for a permit to operate a drive-thru beer store at the corner of Kennedy & Montgomery.

On 1/29/04 over 150 KH residents packed City Hall to Just Say No to the application.

The Ohio Liquor Division got the message and denied the permit.

The owner appealed, and the appeals hearing is set for 1/26/05...in Columbus.

This time most witnesses will not have to talk. The Attorney General representing the Liquor Division (thus defending the decision) is selecting a dozen or so residents to speak. But he's counting on a crowd of residents to pack the hearing room in a show of community unity. Consider it "Silent Testimony."

The case will be heard by the three Liquor Commissioners, including former State Senator Janet Hioward (from Forest Park).

Eastwood Closes Woodford Absorbs

The School Board is closing Eastwood Paideia (in Madisonville) and transferring the Eastwood students to Woodford Paideia (in Kennedy Heights).

The changes, announced in mid-November, will take effect next fall and are part of CPS's belt-tightening "fiscal responsibility."

Meanwhile at K&M

Consolidation of Woodford and Eastwood makes it clear that CPS considers Woodford a "magnet" school, with the Paideia program drawing students from various neighborhoods.

KHCC continues to make the case with the Board of Education for building a new neighborhood school at the corner of Kennedy & Montgomery. KHCC's position is that this is the most logical, practical, and economical site for replacement of Silverton School.

So far, however, the Board of Education appears wedded to its plan to rebuild Silverton in Silverton--on the far edge of the Cincinnati school district.

CPOP Works With Northdale Landlords

The KH CPOP team is reaching out to landlords on Northdale Place, in hopes of making an impact on drug dealing on that dead-end street.

For several months CPOP has been considering innovative strategies to make a difference on Kennedy Ave. and its feeder streets. Those strategies have included erecting fences along the Kennedy bridge, to deter drug dealers who reportedly stash their wares under the bridge.

The landlord initiative aims at helping landlords better screen tenants and remove tenants who use their buildings as havens for illegal activity.

Liquor Permit Transferred

Thomas Wilson has had a permit to sell beer and wine at Wilson's Grocery at 3800 Zinsle Ave.

In 2002 the permit was put into "safekeeping" status, which means it was not being used but could be reacitvited.

In August, 2004, Mr. Wilson applied to have the license transferred to Frances Canty, doing business as Wilson's Market at the same address.

In early December there was a state liquor hearing at City Hall on the transfer. The City did not object to the transfer--and did not inform KHCC of the hearing. Kathy Tyler, owner of the day care center next door (In God's Hands), appeared at the hearing but was not allowed to testify because she had no legal standing.

KHCC Budget Proposal

he KHCC Board will present its recommended budget to Council at the January 22 meeting (Saturday Town Meeting).

With minor changes yet to be made, the budget will resemble the numbers shown on the right. Thanks to some onetime grants, Council's projected income is about \$90,000. However, the total can be misleading because two of those grants (United Way & City) are for specific projects and already committed.

The Board will recommend that we hire a part-time community coordinator (a position that has been vacant for the past 18 months), which will account for much of the "Administration" expense.

Fund raising projections are modest increases over the 2004 income from the door to door (and mail) campaign, to which over 300 residents made a contribution to KHCC. That's almost ten percent of the total households in Kennedy Heights. Advertisement
