The City Manager and Police Chief Streicher surprised City Council and community residents alike by announcing that the City is eliminating neighborhood officers.

The City Managers' memo explains that since "every Cincinnati Police Officer has been trained in problem solving and community interaction" there is no longer a need to designate

just one cop to work with the neighborhood. In short: We'll now be able to call ALL officers our "neighborhood officer."

Assistant Chief Janke presented the change at the 2/4 Neighborhood Summit. He said that under the new system three officers will designated for neighborhood contacts and predicted that residents will ultimately conclude that the change has been for the better.

Residents from several neighborhoods got applause at the Neighborhood Summit with critical and skeptical comments and question. They did not like the handling of the sudden change and feared that making every officer a "neighborhood officer" is a step backwards.

While some neighborhoods have reportedly been dissatisfied with the performance of their neighborhood officers, not so KH.

We'll miss you, Officer Engleman.

Reactions to Police Change

The announced change in Neighborhood Policing prompted a flurry of emails to-from-and among various community leaders across the city.

This message from Mt. Washington to City Council got right to the point:

"The Neighborhood Officers connect with the people in their neighborhoods in a way that can not be copied or done with some other arrangement. PLEASE keep the Neighborhood Officers!!!!"

Undoubtedly all Council members responded in some fashion. Here's part of Councilmember Bortz's response to the Mt. Washington plea.

"You can expect to have increased access to your police department. There will be a Lieutenant and Sergeant on every shift acting as the primary liaison between the community and the police department.

They will oversee the integration of CPOP into all police operations.

The message is that the police department is available 24/7 to work closely with residents to solve the crime problems in their communities. As you know, crime doesn't stop when your neighborhood officer is on vacation or has time off.

Like you, we will be watching the implementation of this change closely. I do not want to jump the gun and undercut what the Chief believes will be a very positive step for police community work. I am supportive of the Chief's decision and respect his expertise. I would like to give it a chance.

I see no reason why grassroots leaders like yourself and your neighbors can not continue to successfully work with Capt. Raabe and his officers. If the officers do not respond positively to the change or are less responsive to your needs, I would like to know immediately.

PR Montessori Kindergarten Registration

You might have noticed...Pleasant Ridge School has disappeared! The new Montessori School is expected to open in late 2007 or early 2008. That will be the neighborhood school for part of Kennedy Heights (generally west of Kennedy Ave.).

If your preschooler is in the PR School attendance area, he or she can attend the temporary Montessori school in the PR Baptist Church.

Montessori kindergarten and 1st-2nd grades will also begin at the start of the 2006 school year at the temporary site of the Pleasant Ridge School in Madisonville.

\$\$ Voucher Slots Available \$\$

As reported last month, if your child now attends John Parker School, he or she can transfer to a private school next fall...and the State of Ohio will cover the tuition up to \$4,250.

63 KH children now attend Parker.

The same deal is available for students scheduled to start kindergarten at Parker next fall.

Academic Emergency

That's because John Parker is on the statewide list of schools that are in "academic emergency."

The State calls this a "scholarship." Because the grant is not based on merit, the better term is probably "voucher."

Would Cover Nativity Tuition

Nativity is a Catholic school in Pleasant Ridge. KHCC has confirmed with the principal that Nativity not only has vacancies, but the voucher would cover the full tuition.

Although vouchers can be used at any private school, almost all the schools listed in a recent Enquirer article were religious. Schools such as Seven Hills don't appear to be interested (though you could certainly ask!).

First Come, First Serve

The State has funds for 14,000 vouchers. They will be distributed statewide, first come-first served.

- ☐ First: Apply and be accepted at the non-public school.
- Then apply for the voucher/ scholarship.
