Who Should Stand For Ohio? Duane Holm

ennedy heights residents and fellow Ohioans have a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to choose **which** historic Ohioan will represent Ohio in Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol.

Every state sends two U.S. senators to Washington, but every state also sends two representatives to National Statuary Hall. Since the 1880's, statues of James Garfield and William Allen have served as Ohio's two representatives in Statuary Hall in the U.S. Capitol.

A group of Ohio state legislators recently began a process to select a replacement for Allen, a former member of Congress and Ohio's governor from 1874-1876. Allen's proslavery views led Ohio leaders to seek a new Ohio representative for Statuary Hall for the 21st century.

There are ten now finalists in the running. Reflecting our positive experience as an intentionally integrated community, KH Community Council has voted its support for Harriet Beecher Stowe. You,

of course, make your own choice, but KHCC believes that Ms. Stowe is the most appropriate of the ten.

Losing her son in a Cincinnati cholera epidemic jolted Stowe into understanding that enslaved mothers must feel



when they lose children to slavery. Her surprise best seller novel, *Uncle Tom's Cabin,* portrayed the brutality of slavery and convinced many Americans that slavery had to end.

Choosing Harriet Beecher Stowe to represent us in Statuary Hal will send the right message about Ohioans to the many Americans who visit our nation's capitol.

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KHDC

Three years ago, with leadership from our Community Council, the KH Development Corp. (KHDC) was reestablished (it discontinued in 1983).

KHDC is a non-profit organization that has a board of trustees with 14 volunteers, of whom 12 are KH residents.

KHDC is 100% volunteer, with no staff or paid consultant.

Our mission is to invigorate the viability of KH businesses and improve the quality of our housing stock.

For the next two or so years KHDC's primary goals are establishing a cultural center and improving foreclosed residences.

Hilton Davis Clean-Up

KHCC voted March s9 to join Pleasant Ridge CC in urging the Ohio EPA to **remove** chemical contaminants from the Hilton Davis site rather than simply trying to contain them.

KHDC Tackling Community Projects

KHDC's goal is to turn the corner at Kennedy & Montgomery into a cultural center, which could bring enormous vitality to our business district, increase the visibility of the KH Arts Center and *ballet tech cincinnati*, establish KH as the core of the arts district (District A) recently created by KH and Pleasant Ridge, and change the conversation that we and others have about our neighborhood.

The cultural center would have three partners.

- The Cincinnati Art Museum (CAM) wants to create an outreach center, storing and exhibiting precious art that is now stored in Columbus. The center would allow their stored art to be accessible for viewing by patrons, visitors (such as school-led tours).
- The KH Arts Center would use space for artist studios.
- The KH Montessori Center was displaced by the closing and (soon to begin) demolition of Woodford School. The Montessori Center (now temporarily in a church on Ridge Ave.) has identified this as its preferred new home, serving 80 or more preschoolers.

\$2.4 Project

The cultural center is a \$2.4 million project. The building would be adapted, not demolished, and it would have a new and dynamic facade, with extensive landscaping.

- KHDC now has a \$300,000 commitment from the City; The Chamber of Commerce has recommended to Governor Strickland that the state allocate us \$300,000 from a special State program.
- We hope to access access an additional \$75,000 from the City.
- One of our principal partners is prepared to make a very substantial financial commitment. The two remaining partners are actively exploring financial support from a variety of sources.

High Hopes

There are a lot of pieces that have yet to be put together, but prospects for success look good. It is hard to underestimate the potential long-term benefits a cultural center could have on our business district and our precious neighborhood. For decades Kennedy School dominated the corner of Kennedy &

Montgomery. In the late '70's the school was razed and replaced by a Kroger store. Kroger lasted only a few years, and



the building's last tenant (Furniture Fair) closed several years ago.

The property is now (again) owned by Cincinnati Public Schools, which bought it as the intended site for Pleasant Ridge School. Ever since CPS changed its mind and rebuilt Pleasant Ridge (in P Ridge) the property has been vacant except for use as a CPS warehouse.

Foreclosure Rehab

The City has selected KH as one of five neighborhoods to receive federal funds for rehabilitating foreclosed properties and vacant homes (1-2 family). The intent is to stabilize streets that have been hit by foreclosure.

The City will put up to \$40,000 toward the cost of rehabbing and selling each of four properties to be selected by KHDC. To help us complete the project, we have contracted with the Homesteading and Urban Development Corporation (HURC).

The site selection committee has identified several possible homes, and by the time you're reading this we may well have begun the first rehab.

Although KHDC is separate, non-profit corporation, it is closely tied to KH Community Council, of which every adult resident is automatically a member.

At every monthly meeting of the Community Council's Board and of the Council, a KHDC report about the two major goals, and other matters, are provided. Feel free to come with your enthusiasm, critical review, and ideas.


