RED BANK ROAD BIKE LANE INSTALLATION UPDATE

On January 15 Community Council hosted a *Bike Lane Open House Session* where representatives from the Cincinnati Department of Transportation and Engineering (DOTE) presented the City of Cincinnati's comprehensive bikeway plan and shared three alternative options for bike lanes on Red Bank Road. Approximately 35 people attended the meeting.

The Red Bank Road bikeway would provide the neighborhood's first dedicated bike route and connect to the Ohio River Bikeway as part of the Eastern Corridor Red Bank Connector project which is under design via the Ohio Department of Transportation.

The session provided an opportunity for each attendee to voice opinions

regarding the proposed reduction or removal off on-street parking, rider safety, and the ability of the various options to serve the needs of less experienced cyclists, children and recreational riders. Several Red Bank residents voiced concerns regarding the reduction or removal of parking along Red Bank. Representatives from Pleasant Ridge cited the current safety issues that cyclists face on local streets. Representatives from Madisonville Community Council, Cincinnati Public Schools and Queen City Bikes shared plans for the expansion of the bike lanes and explain the advantages and disadvantages of the options.

Options 1 and 2 provide painted bike lanes along the curb at both sides of the street extending (continued on p. 2)

RED BANK ROAD BIKE LANE UPDATE (continued from p. 1)

continuously from Woodford Road to the south to the corporation boundary near Ehrling Road. Option 2 differs from the first option by providing parking along the southbound side of the street near the intersection of Woodford Road. The third option includes a single "climbing lane" along the east side of the street. The climbing lane would only accommodate northbound riders and there would be no bike lane on the southbound side of the street.

Representatives of DOTE and Queen City Bike noted that dedicated bike lanes are more likely to be used by less experienced cyclists and children. Nern Ostendorn of Queen City Bike also discussed the potential to link the bike lanes to Woodford School and the "Safe Routes to School" program

which is intended to increase physical activity among children by creating safer options for walking or riding to school. Links to the Bike Master Plan and copies of the alternative plans can be viewed at http://www.cincinnati-oh.gov/bikes/news/feedback-needed-on-red-bank-road-design-options/.

Join us for a bike ride and look for more information at the upcoming *Sap Run* event. Council does not anticipate making final recommendations to DOTE until further investigation of the alternatives can be completed.

KENNEDY HEIGHTS CULTURAL CENTER PROJECT STATUS

Phase 1 construction activity started this month and the pace of activity will accelerate leading up to the late-June occupancy of the Cincinnati Art Museum. The Museum's first and only neighborhood outreach center will provide state-of-the-art storage and viewable display of their archived collection.

The Kennedy Heights Montessori Center takes occupancy in early August and will begin the 2013 school year with a totally new 8000-squarefoot facility and spacious outdoor play area that adjoins the June Alexander Playfield.

The Kennedy Heights Arts Center is developing plans for artist studios as well as conference and event spaces which will compliment and support their facility and programming goals. They will take occupancy during Phase 2 of the project which is expected to kick off later this year.

To date, nearly \$2 million in funding has been raised towards the Phase 1 funding target. Now our goal is to raise \$150,000 from individual donors, residents, families, other neighborhood stakeholders, and arts patrons throughout the city. We need to raise at least half of that amount—or \$75,000—this spring and the remaining portion by the fall. All donations will be used toward capital construction costs to complete common area improvements and tenant spaces for the project partners.

Individual members of the Kennedy Heights Development Corporation (KHDC) Board have already donated or pledged \$15,000 to get us to our initial goal of \$75,000. In addition to this amount, other long-time Kennedy Heights residents have pledged \$30,000 as a challenge grant! This means that every dollar donated from individuals and families like you will

be **doubled**, giving us the opportunity to meet our initial goal of \$75,000! All new individuals and families who donate any amount will see their gift doubled and also receive public recognition at the Cultural Center.

SUMMARY OF KHCC JANUARY 2013 MEETING MINUTES

KHCC Meeting Tuesday January 15, 2013 7:30–8:30 PM

KHCC President Michelle Dillingham called the meeting to order and all attendees introduced themselves to the group.

Fire & Police Reports

A Fire Department officer shared statistics from 2012 and reminded residents to be careful of space heaters. He also told residents that there is a paramedic on every engine in the city. Police Officer Engelmann shared stats from December 15, 2012 through January 13, 2013. Thefts that involve large air conditioning units are increasing. He gave the number to call for inoperable vehicles on the street: 979-4465. Several residents inquired about removal of dead animals in their yards. The general number to call for city services is 591-6000. Officer Engelmann shared that the city funded "walking" program ended December 31.

Treasurer's Report: Sarah Stamper

Sarah shared a final report of all 2012 expenditures and a tentative budget for 2012. Clete Benken motioned to approve the draft of the budget. MOTION APPROVED.

VP for Administration Report: Jim Zarnowiecki

Jim shared a report that outlined specific programs and events for the Kennedy Heights Community. He shared a tentative calendar of monthly events and current chairs for each committee. Committees include: Finance/Development, Communications, Events, and Health and Safety.

VP for Planning Report: Clete Benken

Cultural Center: Bids are coming in for the Cultural Center project.
Kennedy Heights Development Corporation hopes to select a contractor by the second week of February. There will be artists' studios (through the KHAC), special

collections from the Cincinnati Art Museum, and the Kennedy Heights Montessori Center. The Center recently received a large donation of \$100,000 and fundraising efforts will continue in earnest early in 2013. The Art Museum plans to move into the center in June and the Kennedy Heights Montessori Center will be in by August.

Former Schroder Property: Clete shared an update on the status of

the property and recognized the working group of Kate Kern, Vannessa Williams, Karen Thomas, Dave Snyder and Caitlin Siegel Hartzler for their contributions in creating the position statement that was approved by KHCC. The Schroder building has recently been sold at auction, and Council will remain involved in the communication process as plans develop. There are no other efforts by the working group planned for now.

Representatives from the Cincinnati Department of Transportation and Engineering (DOTE) shared three alternative options for bike lanes on Red Bank Road during an Open House meeting from 6:30-7:30 and also during a portion of the regular meeting. Residents from Kennedy Heights and representatives from Pleasant Ridge and Madisonville voiced their opinions regarding the proposed reduction or removal off on-street parking, rider safety, and the ability of the various options to serve the needs of less experienced cyclists, children and recreational riders. Representatives from Cincinnati Public Schools and Queen City Bikes shared plans for the expansion of the bike lanes and explained the advantages and disadvantages of the options. CREATIVE WRITING, COMMUNITY, AND THE KENNEDY HEIGHTS ARTS CENTER

Creative writer Wendy McVicker doesn't just write poetry—she does her best to "incite" it, as she says, whether in schools, libraries, or community centers like the Kennedy Heights Art Center. With *that* kind of attitude toward creative writing, it's no wonder the Art Center chose Ms. McVicker to be its 2013 artist-inresidence.

This year's residency, *Hear Your Dreams, See Your Voice*, is all about the written word, and beginning April 6, poet McVicker will spend several weeks spreading that word in the Kennedy Heights community with creative writing workshops and classes. Are you interested in

creative writing? Join a class, and bring a friend!

During her four-week residency, Wendy will meet two or three times a week with a core group of 10- to 14-year-olds to write and share poetry. Their youthful words will become the heart of the project, serving as guiding inspiration as additional groups meet weekly to write and suggest other methods for artistic interaction. "Our community residents' creative interests, whatever the medium, will be valuable to the project," said KHAC Executive Director Ellen Muse-Lindeman.

Ms. McVicker, who is from Athens,

Ohio, is a creative writer with 25 years of experience in leading poetry workshops and residencies. Through both these and her writing, she strives to reveal the rich gift of language to participants of all ages and experience, and seeks "to honor memory and the slow, deep process of knowing," as she has said.

She recently began performing with musician Emily Prince and in 2011, a group of University of Dayton typography students made posters of some of her poems that were displayed in the Dayton Metro Library and other southern Ohio venues. This year that project has moved to Ohio University and it will include other poets. Ms. McVicker is always seeking the discoveries that arise from this kind of collaborative exploration.

The residency will kick off with a performance by Ms. McVicker on **Saturday April 6** from **4:00–6:00 PM** at the Kennedy Heights Arts Center, 6546 Montgomery Road. A full schedule of residency classes is available at **www.kennedyarts.org**. Participants may register via the KHAC website or by calling the center at 513-631-4278. Participation is entirely **FREE**.
