50TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATION

50 years of Kennedy Heights Community Council was the occasion for celebration during the first weekend in June. The Family Celebration and Cookout at Kennedy Park kicked off the festivities with host Clete Benken grilling a variety of meats and neighbors providing side dishes. The weather cooperated, with not a single thunderstorm to spoil the occasion. Good conversations with new neighbors and those not so new to the neighborhood were enjoyed by the 70 people who came to the cookout.

The party continued the next day at the Council Presidents' Celebration, which was held at Kennedy Heights Presbyterian Church. Neighbors filled the Fellowship Hall and enjoyed a buffet dinner catered by Sharon Childress as they listened to music by Undercover, a local jazz band. The conversation provided another 'delicious' ingredient: One of the members of the band is Harry Stebbins, a Kennedy Heights resident. Lining one of the walls of Fellowship Hall were historical displays that gave neighbors a chance to learn about the Community Council's past and reminisce about their own experiences.

The Master of Ceremonies was Andrew Setters, a WLWT News 5 reporter and new Kennedy Heights resident.

Yvette Simpson represented the Mayor's office and read a proclamation of the numerous ways that the Kennedy Heights Community Council has impacted the neighborhood. State Senator Eric Kearney was unable to be present but sent a proclamation that was read by Lawrence Coleman, Sr., a member of the KHCC 50th Anniversary

Committee.

The Rev. Robert Harper, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Kennedy Heights, lead the Litany. It noted the areas of life in which the Community Council has worked to ensure a stable place for residents to live and to be productive. Audience members responded with affirmations to continue the vision that started in 1963.


Bob Herring, Nativity School principal and a lifelong Kennedy Heights resident, spoke of living in the neighborhood during the 1950s and early 1960s and described how things have changed and yet remain the same. Social interactions among the residents and opportunities provided by the neighborhood were the reasons that he and his wife, Marilyn, chose to live in Kennedy Heights and raise their family here. Teresa Davis Mulligan talked about growing up in the neighborhood but not fully appreciating what the community offered—diversity, neighborliness, genuine character of residents, location and architectural uniqueness of the homes—until she moved back to Kennedy Heights with her family after living on the East Coast.

Former Community Council Presidents and past recipients of the Citizen of the Year Award were recognized. Current KHCC President Michelle Dillingham thanked everyone for coming and urged each person to continue the tradition of supporting the Council with time and monetary assistance.



KHCC APRIL 2013 MEETING NOTES (HIGHLIGHTS)

4/16/13 Meeting • 7:30–8:30 PM Call to order and introductory remarks were made by M. Dillingham. Each attendee introduced him/herself to the

group. No new neighbors were present.

Fire Report: None

Police Report (Officers Engelmann and Tucker): PVO for KH & PR from 4/23—5/9. There will be a 2-man walk or ride detail; police will patrol from 12:00—4:00 AM. Drug dealer arrest on Ravenal Ct. involving warrant issues; involvement of District 3 officers. Crime report 3/16—4/11/2013: 1 robbery; 4 thefts [including 2 auto thefts]; 4 aggravated robberies; 1 burglary; 1 aggravated burglary; and 3 felonious assaults including an incident at the bus stop near the Family Dollar store. Officers are working with the Silverton Police to find out if there have been similar incidents. A resident reported hovering police helicopters near his street and that the new owner of the former Shroder School is not maintaining the property. There are signs of vandalism and trash and debris have been dumped at the school. Officer Engelmann reported that the police know about these incidents and Officer Tucker said that the Health Dept. can be called in if needed and the owners can be cited. Officer Engelmann

also said that a person who works for the owner had recently asked for a patrol of the property, apparently due to recent citations for tire dumping.

Motion to Approve March Council Minutes: M. Dillingham motioned to approve the March minutes. MOTION APPROVED.

Treasurers Report: S. Stamper gave current balance and motioned to approve the monthly budget. MOTION APPROVED.

Brad Berkholder, Call Center Manager, City of Cincinnati Public **Services:** Starting 4/3/13, the city will start distributing the new required garbage cans to residents based on their trash pick-up day. 65-gallon is the default size but residents can request 95-gallon containers. All residences with 4 or fewer units will be assigned (1) garbage can that stays with the property; properties with 5 or more units will need to use a commercial garbage pick-up service. The new requirements are meant to encourage people to recycle more, reduce sanitation worker injury, and spread out the workers. Requirements fully take effect by October and the city will collect garbage only from assigned containers after that time. There will be no more pick-up of

from multiple garbage cans but yard waste will [continue to] be collected every other week with recycling items. Residents can use their non-city garbage cans for yard waste [which can also be taken to one of (4) yard waste drop-off sites in Hamilton County]. There may be amnesty weeks around holidays due to the increase in garbage. The ordinance for the required garbage cans was put in place several years ago but is being enforced now due to budget cuts, environmental concerns, and making Cincinnati greener. There is a set-out service available for elderly and disabled residents.

Gary Payton, Social Worker, **Comprehensive Recovery Coaching** and Addiction Education: A negative impact of drug use in a neighborhood is resident turnover. Heroine has exploded in the community, with kids starting off with painkillers and then graduating to heroine. There is considerable lack of information among kids and their parents who may not know the symptoms of drug use. "Paco" [synthetic marijuana] is not big in the KH community. The problem is that people are taking [these types of] drugs with the idea that they will not cause damage/addition but are not "coming back" once they start using. There is less treatment (continued on next page)

and more jail for drug users. All of the free treatment centers are full, leaving only expensive rehab centers and insurance-only facilities.

VP for Administration Report (J. Zarnowiecki): 78 people registered for Sap Run XX and 100 came to the breakfast. Suggestions for future races include the addition of competitive running and biking. The winner of the Sap Run is Daniel Kasperowicz. P&G volunteers from Sharonville will be in KH for clean-up on 4/19. The 50th Anniversary Celebration will be held on 6/1 and 6/2. Invitations for the 6/2 dinner [at KHPC] will be sent to all residents, though there is a limit of 200 people. Price will be \$10/person. The Community Concert [on 6/13] will lead into the Juneteenth celebration weekend [6/15 and 6/16] at Drake Park. Citizens on Patrol will collaborate with PR and

Madisonville. A youth committee is forming out of Shroder High School. Students are creating a video for the KHCC 50th Anniversary that will be shown at the dinner. KHCC door-to-door fundraising will begin on 5/15/13. There will be an "adopt-a-pot" initiative to install/maintain flower pots on Kennedy Avenue. Each pot costs \$150.00. Support will be provided for Ally Nurre's sunflower contest.

VP for Planning Report (C. Benken):

The roof of the Cultural Center has been replaced, demo is taking place, and the contractor is soliciting permits. KHDC needs a consent letter regarding Museum storage [stating that we are okay with it]. A use variance is needed for a special exception for fencing. C. Benken made a motion to approve both of these. MOTIONS APPROVED. KHCC will accept donations at the

fiftieth anniversary cookout [on 6/1]. He will provide meats and drinks; residents should bring side dishes. He also recapped the March PR-KH *PLAN CINCINNATI* meeting and said that there would be additional details at the next [May] meeting.

Communications Report (K. Brown):

The newsletter went to print on 4/15/13 and delivery will occur as soon as the end of the week of 4/22/13.
