CONGRATULATIONS TO OUR COMMUNITY CATALYST OF THE YEAR NOMINEE

rnie Barbeau, past president of the Kennedy Heights Community Council and Development Corporation, is our nominee for the Community Catalyst of the Year Award that will be presented on March 7 at Cincinnati's Neighborhood Summit. The award recognizes a neighborhood volunteer whose energy and ideas get community members involved and excited, produce good outcomes, and result in increased neighborhood engagement.

Ernie has been a prime catalyst in the evolution of the Kennedy Heights Cultural Campus, a \$3 million redevelopment project that will convert a blighted, vacant former Kroger store into a vibrant home for the Kennedy Heights Montessori Center

and the Kennedy Heights Arts Center's Lindner Annex.

Ernie has facilitated over \$1 million of investment in our community which has brought improvements to the Kennedy Heights Business District. As part of the 2014 celebration of Kennedy Heights' one hundredth anniversary as a Cincinnati neighborhood, he collaborated with a Public History class at the University of Cincinnati to publish *The Kennedy Heights Experiment, from Hilltop Suburb to Multi-Racial Community 1882-2014*, a 50-page book that details the community's success at racial and economic diversity.

2014 KENNEDY HEIGHTS LANDSCAPE AWARD WINNERS

hank you to all of you who submitted nominations for the 2014 Kennedy Heights Landscape Awards. The committee of judges, led by Annette Delaney, had many fine-quality gardens to critique. In the end, the following five were declared the winners.

Judy & Ernie Barbeau, Kinoll Avenue
The Barbeaus have lived in Kennedy
Heights for 25 years. The attention that
they have paid to their garden over the
years has paid off: this is their third win
and they are now members of the Kennedy Heights Landscape Award Hall of
Fame.

The Barbeaus' garden is a work in progress. They have planted many perennials, trees, and shrubs over the years to enhance their wooded lot and provide year round beauty that they enjoy from their glass-enclosed porch and back deck. They rely on large pots of annuals for eyepopping color and tend to plant begonia varieties since these are generally deerresistant. The white picket fence and accent lighting on the trees and shrubs in the front yard are special touches that make their landscape a standout.

The Barbeaus' advice to other gardeners is to be thoughtful when determining what and where to plant. Consider such factors as how much sun or shade the plant needs. Do you want the plant to provide privacy or perhaps security? How much time are you willing to invest in maintaining it? Such considerations should enable you to choose the right plant and placement for your needs.

Theresa & Howard Cohen, Welton Avenue

This is also the third win for Theresa and Howard in the 20 years that they have lived in Kennedy Heights. Their consistently beautiful garden has earned them a spot in the Kennedy Heights Landscape Hall of Fame. Theresa describes her garden as "cottage-style design" and she has filled it with colorful plants—especially natives—that attract birds, butterflies, and bees.

Through a personal-development grant from her school, she traveled to England and France to study beekeeping and now has an active hive in her backyard. To accommodate their desire for an edible garden, the Cohens grow dwarf fruit trees and bushes in pots around their deck and rent a bed at the Giving Garden for growing vegetables.

Theresa's advice for gardeners to improve the look of their beds is to repeat spots of color throughout the garden to tie it all together. For large landscaping projects, she suggests getting a low-interest HIP (home improvement loan). She and Howard used a HIP to terrace their sloping backyard and to build a retaining wall.

Sandy Rhoads, Iris Avenue

Sandy moved to Kennedy Heights in 2009 and began transforming the beds around her house by amending them with homemade compost. She then planted them with perennials so that every season has something of interest. The ground-level front porch is a prominent feature of Sandy's house, and through the use of potted plants, she has made it an extension of her garden.

The porch is also the stage for her homemade hypertufa planters (made with cement to look like stone) that contain her collection of sedums and other miniature perennials. Her backyard includes a raised bed of her favorite vegetables and like the Cohens, she grows dwarf fruit trees and shrubs in pots.

The local deer travel regularly through her garden eating as they go, and squirrels regularly dig up her potted plants. To thwart them, she no longer grows the plants such as Hostas and pansies that they like to eat. To her, it is not worth the stress when there are so many beautiful plants that these animals do not eat. She covers the soil in her containers with broken, terracotta pot shards to keep squirrels from digging there. In the backyard, she uses netting to keep deer and squirrels out

of her vegetables.

Sarah Stamper, McHugh Place

Shortly after Sarah moved to Kennedy Heights in 2012, she began creating her backyard garden with the help of her mother, Gretchen Theissen. The following year, she and her mother worked on the front garden. Her flower beds are the focus of her yard with the lawn serving only to accentuate the lines of the beds. To facilitate relaxing and enjoying the gardens, she created a sitting area in both the front and backyards. Sarah also designed the garden so that she can enjoy its features while looking out the upstairs windows. Sarah and her mother collect broken statuary and architectural fragments. By placing them artfully in the garden, they evoke a sense that the garden has been there for years and, of course, keep it looking interesting in the winter.

Sarah offers these money-saving tips for gardeners. Check the Lowe's sales rack regularly for perennials. Don't be put off by a plant that is no longer blooming or that looks a little rough.

Sarah says that by the next season it will look great. She also suggests sowing seeds of annuals directly in the garden rather than buying transplants. She gets summer-long color for the price of a pack of seeds. She has particularly good luck with zinnias and marigolds.

TELLING THE KENNEDY HEIGHTS STORY

ennedy Heights' recent commemoration of its annexation to the City of Cincinnati in 1914 led to many events and outcomes. One of those outcomes was the development of a 49-page booklet, The Kennedy Heights Experiment: From Hilltop Suburb to Multi-Racial Community 1882–2014. Dr. Charles F. ("Fritz") Casey-Leininger and seven students and produced this fabulous booklet during the 2014 Spring semester of the Public History Practicum in the University of Cincinnati Department of History.

Dr. Leininger invited me to serve as an advisor to the students. It was a marvelous experience which led me to initiate additional research. Over the past eighteen months I visited several local libraries and have accessed several online sources. My research is also propelled by a special neighbor, the late Jim Cebula, and a deep affection for our neighborhood's unique and precious qualities. Jim was a long-time resident of Davenant Avenue, and a Professor of History at UC's Raymond Walter campus. I came to know Jim when he was a member of the Community Council's Comprehensive Community Plan Committee, at which time I was Chair. A few years later, Jim

was the author of two excellent articles about our neighborhood: "Creating a Multi-Racial Community in Post-World War II Cincinnati: The Kennedy Heights Experiment" (Ohio Valley History, Fall 2007); and "Kennedy Heights: A Fragmented Hilltop Suburb" (Cincinnati Historical Society Bulletin, Summer 1976). As public historians, Jim and Fritz serve as my role models.

My research has been focused on the 1862–1914 period—when we were a community of Columbia Township and later the Village of Kennedy Heights. Based on *Cincinnati Enquirer* articles and items, annual editions of the *Williams' Cincinnati Directory*, and other library sources, I have drafted a major document about this period and a subset of special documents about the Lewis Kennedy family (26 pages), Yononte Inn (19 pages), Christ Episcopal Mission (5 pages), and information on 275 Village residents (50 pages).

I have kept the Community Council's immediate past president, Michelle Dillingham, informed about my research and have started conversations with our current president, Dan Kasprowicz. This spring I will have conversations with the

KHCC Board about the establishment of a mechanism that would increase our knowledge and awareness of our neighborhood's past and ways to 'broadcast' the richness of both our past and future.

During 2015 I hope to write several articles for our newsletter and webpage on topics related to the Kennedy Heights' history.
