

TELLING THE KENNEDY HEIGHTS STORY #5: LEWIS KENNEDY, PART 4

In November 1888, Kennedy told the Enquirer "that suburban property is in good demand," and that he sold two houses and two lots. In the same month the Enquirer reported that he sold four lots on Kennedy Ave., a seven-room house for \$4,500, and a six-room house for \$3,589. In February 1889, Kennedy sold a residence in Avondale to the President of Cincinnati's Western German Bank. Later that month he sold a lot at Pleasant Ridge. Three months later it was announced that Kennedy and Alexander Clark "have gone into business as real estate brokers".

Kennedy was involved in several law suits: In 1883 he sued Martha A. Clark on a foreclosure issue to recover \$16,680, and he lost a breach of contract suit in the Superior Court. In 1884 he was sued again for breach of contract "for delivery of a number of cars of barley." In 1887, as a result of Chicago's wheat market collapse, Kennedy was separately sued by three parties: The Third

National Bank, the Chemical Bank of New York, and Siebern. His attorney stated that Kennedy's losses were "about \$40-50,000 during the past year in speculation in wheat and other deals." Kennedy was "compelled to mortgage his real estate to the extent of \$20-30,000...He lost \$10–5,000 in the (Chicago wheat deal)... (and) liabilities are from \$125,000-150,000...Kennedy is a man of middle age, of family, and has been in business in this city for about twenty-five years. He has always stood high in the business community." In September Mr. Kennedy's company was appraised at \$33,140 in real estate, and \$2,100 in other assets.

In 1888 he was sued again and lost. In another situation, the *Enquirer* stated that the cause of the failure of a company (Lobnitz & Son) was the inability of the firm to collect what was owed them... They had about \$5,000 due from Lewis Kennedy for work done at Kennedy Heights. He failed and there is little prospect of getting that..."

KH NOTABLE CITIZEN: AL GERHARDSTEIN

Kennedy Heights has many wonderful people. Instead of picking one for Citizen of the Year, we will introduce a notable citizen in each newsletter. Our first citizen is Al Gerhardstein

What makes a good neighbor? Some would say friendliness, others, willingness to help. Still others might say opening your doors and being inviting. Civil rights attorney, Al Gerhardstein embodies all of those characteristics and more.

He and his wife, Mimi, have lived in Kennedy Heights since 1977. They came because it was important to be in an integrated, economically diverse neighborhood to raise their children and Kennedy Heights was an obvious choice. Their three children, Ben, Adam and Jessica, graduated from Kennedy Heights Montessori and are doing well in their chosen paths. Al knew this neighborhood was more than just a great place to raise successful children. He wanted to improve our community by giving his time and talent.

- He served as secretary and then treasurer of our Community Council.
- He helped start the KH Development Corporation and served as its President 30 years ago. This group rehabbed many homes acquired at Sheriff's sales and was also responsible for bringing Kroger to our business district. (The location that now houses the KH Cultural Campus.)
- He serves on the board of the revamped KH Development Corporation
- He played an integral role in helping us obtain the beautiful building that now houses our Kennedy Heights Art Center. The former owner had an enormous tax bill that kept compounding. Al represented the widow to eliminate the bill and make the building affordable so our community could buy it and save it from demolition.
- He hosts the Progressive Dinner regularly and loves meeting new neighbors while getting reacquainted with old ones.
- He supports multiple efforts with generous donations to support bringing our beloved KH Montessori Center back to our neighborhood and starting the Cultural Campus.
- He has been a civil rights lawyer and advocate for over 25 years. Notably, he and his law firm represented Obergefell in the landmark Supreme Court Case, decided this past June, which legalized same-sex marriage throughout the United States.

When asked what he loves about Kennedy Heights, Al replied, "It's about settling in and enjoying people." He shared a story about a group of KH neighbors that for many years has gotten together and raked each others' yards sharing a ladder and rototiller for the bigger jobs – bagging and cleaning. Then they all shared a big meal. "This year we decided to just have the dinner and skip the leaves," he shared with a warm laugh. "That's the stuff that's fun to share with neighbors – and to know they are friends."

Thank you AI, for your time, your generosity and for calling Kennedy Heights home. We're proud to have you as a neighbor.
