Our beloved and loyal neighborhood police officer, George Engleman, will retire January 15, 2018. He dedicated 21 years of service to the city of Cincinnati and 12 years to Kennedy Heights, Pleasant Ridge, and Madisonville. He saw a lot of changes during his many years of service: cameras added to patrol cars, body cameras, updated computers, and new weapons for officers.

To Officer Engleman, the best parts of community-oriented policing were having the community as stakeholders and maintaining their trust. He laughs as he admits that the biggest challenge was keeping fit—but he didn't become a Cincinnati police officer until he was 37 years old!

'It's been a pleasure and an honor to serve both Kennedy Heights and Pleasant Ridge," said Officer Engleman. "Play in the Park, Winterfest, Great American Clean Up, and, of course, putting the Bumps on the Bridge have been some of my most memorable and rewarding events. Pleasant Ridge and Kennedy Heights will hold a permanent spot in my heart."

At almost every community council meeting, Officer Engleman reported that Kennedy Heights has one of the lowest crime rates in the city and praised us for our vigilance and cooperation.

### **DISTRICT A CELEBRATES 10 YEARS!**







decade ago, District A (which stands for the ARTS & for ALL of US) came together to achieve a new partnership across neighborhoods. When Kennedy Heights and Pleasant Ridge Community Councils launched this venture, they agreed to share neighborhood arts assets and to seek new and sustainable economic development together.

2008 also marked the birth of Cincinnati Playhouse in the Park's first 'Off-the-Hill' season, with District A as its founding partner. In April 2008, the Playhouse staged a first-ever community performance in Kennedy Heights, and a second in Pleasant Ridge.

### **EXPANDED SUPPORT FOR AREA SENIORS NOW AVAILABLE**

eniors living in Kennedy Heights, Golf Manor, Pleasant Ridge and Silverton, Ohio can now take advantage of new and important consultative services at no cost to them. With the full support of and in cooperation with The Caring Place, which is a Cincinnati-based food pantry, Cincinnati Area Senior Services (CASS) is now providing information and referrals relating to any number of vital services and programs including:

- Government-funded programs
- Transportation
- Meals-on-Wheels, food pantries and food stamps
- Home health aides
- Legal aid
- Counseling, Medical issues, Mental health issues
- Substance abuse
- Elder care services
- Death and funeral planning

To assist seniors, CASS Service Coordinator, Sharon Hale, will be on-site at The Caring Place, located at 6312 Kennedy Avenue, every Tuesday and Thursday from 9:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m.

"Before CASS approached us with this generous service offering, we didn't have a resource in place for these kind of referrals," said Sharifah Tafari, Executive Director of The Caring Place. "Now, we have someone on-site who can meet and sit down with seniors, listen to what their needs are, and pass along possible solutions to their challenges; that means a lot to us and to the seniors."

The Caring Place was founded in 1982 by a coalition of churches and their congregations. Today, the organization provides a number of critical services to area seniors who may need food, clothing, furniture, help with rent and/or utilities, family development or support groups. CASS, which is celebrating 50 years of assisting area seniors, is a local, non-profit, 501c3 organization providing essential services and programs to thousands of seniors throughout Hamilton County.

"CASS and The Caring Place already provide essential daily-living services and programs to seniors via their respective organizations," said Tracey Collins, Chief Executive Officer of CASS. "By working together, seniors who need assistance beyond what The Caring Place offers will now be able to get more information and referrals from a licensed CASS social worker who has professional relationships with any number of trusted and vetted resources." Collins continues, "That peace of mind is invaluable to anyone, but especially to those who face age-related, physical and cognitive challenges."

In addition to its home-delivered Meals-on-Wheels program and eight congregate meals sites, CASS also provides transportation and financial management services to seniors throughout Hamilton County. # TELLING THE KENNEDY HEIGHTS STORY, #12

### **LEWIS AND DELIA KENNEDY, PART 11**

elia, Lewis, and Willis (their married son and only offspring) moved to Pleasant Ridge around 1906. We know of two specific residential addresses: 6014 Montgomery Road, which is now Mullaney's Pharmacy, and 5945 Ridge, which is now the Ridge Building. The latter was also the address for Willis and his wife Ida, who were childless. It was also the residence where Mr. Kennedy and Willis died. Mr. Kennedy died in November 1913 at the age of 78—at a time when the life expectancy for men was then 50.3. Willis died in 1917, at the age of 57.

After Delia Kennedy's death in August 1907, her husband was a widower for six years. During those years there were only three items in the *Enquirer* about him—and all were death notices! (Two notices were customary at the time; three is exceptional). For comparison, in the 1880's the *Enquirer* had eight full articles and fifty mentions in other articles about the Kennedys. Mr. Kennedy continued as the owner of Kennedy Realty until his death. Willis then shared the same business address, 316 Walnut. For several years Willis was identified as a traveling salesman and seed salesman, but we do not know if he had a business relationship with his father.

### **Preliminary Observations about the Kennedys**

I am struck by two matters. First: The year after bankruptcy was settled, Mr. and Mrs. Kennedy's presence in our neighborhood dramatically changed. Second: Mrs. Kennedy's family, the McCulloughs of Pleasant Ridge, seemed more involved with the Kennedys than Mr. Kennedy's family. Of note: Mr. Kennedy and Willis had their first job with Mrs. Kennedy's father, James McCullough, The Cincinnati Seedman. The Kennedys are also buried in a Spring Grove Cemetery lot owned by Mr. McCullough.

If we want to enrich our understanding of the Kennedys, significant gaps need to be filled:

- Photos and obituaries of Lewis, Delia, and Willis and his wife Ida.
- We need more information about Mrs. Kennedy. My primary sources are a dozen or so items from the *Enquirer*. Are there other sources?
- We need more Information about Mr. Kennedy's parents, brothers and sisters.
- The number of property transfers initiated by Mr. Kennedy several weeks before he applied for bankruptcy in 1887 is remarkable. Mr. Kennedy transferred properties to a brother-in-law and also a daughter-in-law. Clarity about the meaning of the documents at the County Recorder's office would be helpful, but I do not have that knowledge.
- Mr. Kennedy may have had real estate in Pleasant Ridge. An extended visit to the County Recorder's office should provide more information.
- For a few years, the Kennedys managed the Lithia Spring Hotel in Tallapoosa, Ga. Additional conversations with the Tallapoosa historical society might produce more relevant information about the Hotel during the Kennedys' tenure.
- I have yet to find evidence that Mr. Kennedy was an official with the Village of Kennedy Heights. The search for documents continues.
- For the Yononte Inn, Mr. Kennedy was an investor and a manager for two or so years, but we do not know to what degree he was an investor. Records of the Inn may clarify.
- The Kennedys may have been a member of a Methodist-Episcopal church, but which church is currently unknown.

Upcoming issues of this column will focus on the Yononte Inn, the Village of Kennedy Heights and its mayors, and the Christ Episcopal Mission. Later this year, this column's content of the past two years will be modified, expanded, and transferred to our webpage.
