AGE FRIENDLY CINCINNATI ADVISORY COMMITTEE

ennedy Heights Aging in Community Team joined the Age Friendly Cincinnati Advisory Committee

In 2018, the City of Cincinnati embarked on a multi-year process to join the AARP network of Age-Friendly Communities. This network recognizes that people of all ages benefit from the adoption of policies and programs that make neighborhoods walkable, feature transportation options, enable access to key services, provide opportunities to participate in community activities, and support housing that's affordable and adaptable.

The next step in the journey to membership is to develop an Age Friendly Advisory Council. When local leaders work together to commit to improve the quality of life for the very young, the very old, and everyone in between we achieve a more livable community.

For your reference, AARP Network of Age-Friendly Communities commit to an assessment process and cycle of continuous improvement, the steps typically require the member community to:

1. Conduct a community needs assessment

- 2. Develop an action and evaluation plan based on the assessment results
- 3. Submit the plan for review by AARP
- 4. Implement and work toward the goals of the plan
- 5. Assess the plan's impact and submit progress reports
- 6. Repeat!

At this time, The City of Cincinnati has nearly completed its community needs assessment. Your voice, as part of our Advisory Council, will be a valuable contribution to our planning and implementation steps (2-6). Well-designed, age -friendly communities foster economic growth and make for happier, healthier residents of all ages; in Cincinnati, this begins with you.

The organizing meeting of this Advisory Committee was held on November 19, 2020.

BRIDGE UPDATE

ennedy Avenue has been closed at Woodford Road since mid-April, when crews demolished the old bridge and began reconstruction. The concrete span will feature 8-foot wide sidewalks, new lights and decorative railings. The project is now projected to reopen mid-January.

There were utility-related delays back in the summer. Fortunately, the contractor completed the new blacktop before the asphalt plant closed down for the winter. The contractor is

now working to complete the last major components—the concrete railing, fencing, and lighting. The \$2.9 million project is funded by a federal grant.
